Martin (The Buck Naked Church of Truth) believes the truth will set you free. So will going buck naked in public — in San Francisco, at least. (In other places, it will result in incarceration.) Martin has had two previous short plays produced, Two Wings and a Breast (Eat Our Shorts 3, 2011) and The Gay Man's Disaster Survival Kit (Eat Our Shorts 4, 2012). Disaster Kit is also being presented as part of Pegasus Theater Company's Tapas Festival at the Rio Nido Lodge near Guerneville, Calif., running Sept. 21 through Oct. 21. Martin wishes to thank his lifelong partner-in-crime, Nick Parham, for his endless love, support, and chapstick supply.

Rich Orloff (Tough Cookie, Vowed & Wowed) is one of the most popular unknown playwrights in the country. His plays have received over 800 productions, numerous awards, and cooles of laughter. Author of over a dozen one-acts and over 70 short plays, Rich's short comedies have been published five times in the annual Best American Short Plays series, three times in The Best Ten-Minute Plays series, in The Bedford Guide to Literature, in the bilingual collection, An Anthology of Contemporary American Plays (published in China), and in anthologies published by Random House and Western Michigan University Press. Before becoming a playwright. Rich wrote for newspapers, magazines, redio, TV, industrial films and educational videos. Rich lives in New York City, but he likes to get out of town frequently to remind himself what the rest of the world is like.

Rodney "Rhoda" Taylor (Baby Christina, Maestro) is the Artistic Director of Left Coast Theatre Co. Producer, actor and playwright, graduated with a Bachelors degree in English with an emphasis in Creative Writing from SFSU in 2009. During the next year, he experimented with his writing and eventually joined the playwright's workshop series with GuyWriters. Under his guidance, he has produced three successful shows: Eat Our Shorts 2: The Secret Lives of San Francisco, which won two awards during the 2010 Fringe Festival, Eat Our Shorts 3: Large Unit Available, and Eat Our Shorts 4: Love & Other Disasters. He is also expanding his acting skills by acting in EOS3, EOS4, and Family Programming. He was recently seen in Twilight Zone Live (Dark Room Theater) as Tina, a 7 year-old girl lost in the 4th Dimension. In his spare time, he is writing a book and is the Director of the Endeavor Foundation for the Arts, a foundation that provides scholarships for LGBT individuals and grants to LGBT artists.

THE CREW

Andrew "AJ" Amare (House Manager) is a board member for Left Coast Theatre Company and House Manager for Family Programming. He's been involved in acting and the theatre community since he was young but is now specifically focusing his efforts on LGBTQ causes and organizations like LCTC. THE DIRECTORS

WHO WE ARE

Left Coast Theatre Company was formed from the successful writing group, GuyWriters Playwrights. After successfully producing several shows under the name GuyWriters, the lead members of the writing group. decided to split from the organization and form their own theater company to focus on producing plays by local gay, lesbian, bisexual, and transgender playwrights.

As members of GuyWriters Playwright, they successfully produced three shows under the Eat Our Shorts collection of short plays. Their first production was in the fall of 2010 during the Annual Fringe Festival. Eat Our Shorts 2: The Secret Lives of San Francisco, took place in September 2010 at Exit on Taylor Theater and showcased five local playwrights. This production went on to win the "Best of Box Office" award for its record ticket sales. The following year, they produced Eat Our Shorts 3: Large Unit Available, in May of 2011 at StageWerx. This show included the works of six playwrights with a cast of fourteen. Over the course of the run, they had six sell-out performances — the total run of the show — before the show even opened.

Their third production, Eat Our Shorts 4: Love and Other Disasters, premiered in February of 2012. This show featured the works of six bay area writers. With the theme of the show dealing with love and its disasters, it was a comedic farce that left the audience laughing for over three weeks of sell-out shows.

No longer concentrating on the works of just gay men, Left Coast aims to foster the works of all writers interested in producing the best queer-themed works possible. The company has also expanded their productions from one show a year to two, and has plans to norease their productions in the upcoming years.
